Decisions, offers, promises...



- Depending on the context, the same sentence (e.g. I'll help you tomorrow) can be understood as a(n):
 - Decision (a spontaneous one)
 - Offer
 - Promise
- Shall I...? Is only used when an offer is asked as a question. E.g. **Shall I** make you a cup of tea?/**Shall I** bring you a glass of water?/**Shall we** open the window?
- `Shall` is used with only 1st person subjects.

- Shall I lend you a hand with your homework?
- I won't do the exam next week.
- I won't get married so soon.
- I'll arrive at the party before them.
- We'll become rich.
- I'll learn to ride horse.

- I won't follow his advice.
- We won't take that route.
- We'll win the match.
- Shall we take you to the station?
