- The matter isn't clear-cut.

• To express adamant refusal:

- That's clearly out of the question.
- You can't be talking seriously...
- I'm afraid to tell you that no way.
- <u>Under no circumstance</u> am I going to accept so (subject-verb inversion).
- That's utterly unfair.
- I dare say that I'm not standing for that.

• To ask questions:

- Don't you agree?
- What are your feelings about...?
- What do you reckon?
- How about you?

-Plenty of...

• To express surprise:

- Surely not!
